OUR BEAUTIFUL LENTEN SERVICES

... Join us in our Journey to Pascha

Last year our parish offered approximately 50 morning and evening Lenten services, starting with Forgiveness Vespers in February and ending with Holy Saturday Liturgy in April--and that's not including our normal weekend services! If you would like to spend more time in prayer this Lent, please consider attending one of each service below, and hopefully more! Here are some descriptions taken from our parish website to help you understand the different services offered.

"Great Compline" - A beautiful service of evening prayer with a number of Psalms, both read and chanted. This service lasts about an hour (except during the first week of Lent, when it is combined with parts of the Great Canon...then, the service lasts about 1 hour and 45 minutes).

"The Great Canon" - A long penitential hymn of verses and refrains, based on different figures from the Bible. During each refrain "Have mercy on me, O God, have mercy on me," it is typical for the faithful to make a prostration or a bow, if possible...except for the chanters who are busy chanting the service. During the first week of Lent, the Great Canon


is divided into 4 parts, with one part added to Great Compline on Monday through Thursday. During the 5th week of Lent, the Great Canon is heard in its entirety with Small Compline (that service lasts 2+ hours).

"Pre-sanctified Liturgy" - A special penitential Liturgy we serve only during Lent. Many of the hymns of Vespers are included in this service. Extra Holy Communion is consecrated on the previous Sunday ("pre-

sanctified"), kept in a special tabernacle on the altar, then served at this Liturgy later in the week. It is especially to give grace and encouragement for those who are engaging in the fast. Pre-sanctified is

about an hour and a half; it is usually preceded by 9th Hour (lots of Psalms) and Typica (selected hymns from our regular Liturgy), which together last about 30 minutes. Usually, these services are on Wednesday evening, followed by a lenten potluck meal and time of fellowship. Those receiving Holy Communion at Pre-sanctified Liturgy are to fast all day before receiving, or at least from after an early, light lenten lunch.

In the Orthodox Church, there are a lot of customs and traditions that are important parts of our worship. From time-to-time, we need to address some of these various etiquette issues to inform our communities how we can best understand each other and work together to worship the all-holy Trinity.



THE IMPORTANCE OF PUNCTUALITY

The time to arrive at Church is before the service starts. If you arrive after the Divine Liturgy begins, try to enter the Church quietly and observe what is happening. If the Epistle or Gospel is being read or the Little or Great Entrance is taking place, wait until it is finished to quickly find a seat. If Father is giving the sermon, stay in the back until he has concluded. Try not to interrupt the Liturgy by your entrance. The best way to avoid this situation is to arrive on time.

ENTERING THE CHURCH

There are certain times during the Liturgy when you should not enter the Church. You may enter the Church at most times except when the Priest has left the Altar and is facing either the congregation or the Altar. You should also not enter the Church during the reading of Epistle or the Gospel.

DURING CHURCH SERVICES COMMUNICATE WITH GOD...ONLY

Wait until coffee hour to say "Hi" to friends and family members. It is not appropriate to greet people and have conversations during the services. Talk to God while in church through your prayers, hymns and thanksgiving. He is waiting to hear from you.

LEAVING BEFORE DISMISSAL

Leaving church before dismissal deprives us of a blessing. Worship has a beginning "Blessed is the Kingdom..." and an end "Let us depart in peace..." To leave immediately after Communion is to treat the church like a restaurant where we come and go as we please.

A FINAL THOUGHT

North American society in the late 20th century is rather casual in its approach to life. Don't allow this prevailing attitude to enter into your Orthodox Christian piety. There are surely a lot of other areas that could be covered here. Much of church etiquette is based on common sense and showing respect for God and others. Always remember that you are in church to worship God, the Holy Trinity. The priest says, "With the fear of God and faith and love, draw near." Let this be the way you approach all of worship. If you do, you will probably have good church etiquette.

"The Akathist Hymn" - The Akathist Hymn during Lent is a special one to the Virgin Mary (called the "Madayeh" service in Arabic), praising and honoring her place in God's plan of salvation. This is one of the most popular lenten services, especially in Lebanon, Syria, and the Holy Land. It lasts a little under an hour.

"Daily Lenten Orthros" - A service of morning prayer, similar to the service we have each Sunday morning before Liturgy. Orthros includes Psalms, beautiful chanting, and litanies. It lasts about an hour.

THE CIRCLE OF LIFE . . . and the power of prayer

A woman of 35 years of age was in a pensive mood. Raised on a small farm in the state of Nebraska, she had been married for 11 years to a wonderful man she loved with all of her heart. At the moment she was living in Germany, her husband having answered an advertisement looking for people to work overseas on a military newspaper. Germany was such an exotic place compared to small-town Nebraska, but she was adjusting.

After her marriage in 1950, she had looked forward with great anticipation to all of the experiences a young couple would encounter on their way to building a lasting relationship. Although they had very little in the way of material possessions, they certainly had riches beyond compare in the ways that really counted. They loved each other deeply, and they had such fun together. Their faith in God was absolute, and they looked forward to children and all of the other great blessings that were sure to follow.

The years passed, and it seemed that every month another brother or sister, or in-law was calling with the happy news that a baby was on the way, and to ask in delicate and not so delicate ways whether anything of the sort was happening with her.

After many prayers to the Lord and to His Blessed Mother, she and her husband eventually came to a startling realization. For reasons known only to Him, the Good Lord had decided that maybe instead of their own children, they were destined to raise the children of others. They decided to adopt.

Along came Joey, and little Tommy soon followed. With the adoption of Mary her joy knew no bounds. They were such cute little things, and such good children, too. Everyone in the family loved them as well, and all in all, life was good.

Eleven years. In some ways it seemed that the time had flown by. Outwardly, they seemed like such a happy little family, of the "Father Knows Best" or "Leave it to Beaver" variety. And they *were* happy, but beneath all of that there remained in her heart a secret little sorrow.

She was awakened from her reverie by a knock on the door. It was unusual to have visitors at this time of day. She opened the door, and was taken aback by what she encountered.

"Have I ever told you about how you came into the world?" We were sitting in the kitchen on Frances Street. As usual,

"Your dad and I had been married for eleven years, and we had adopted, Joe, Tom, and Mary by that time. We had pretty much given up the thought of having kids of our own," she said, as she formed a perfect red rose on her baker's pin.

"Well," she continued, "One day I was sitting at the kitchen table over in Germany, and I heard a knock on the door. I answered, and I looked into the eyes of a young Spanish woman holding a small child in her arms."

"Please," she said. "You help me?"



"I took her inside, and fixed her some lunch. It turned out she had absolutely nothing to her name. I found them some clothes, and I gave her one of Mary's coats for her daughter. She thanked me over and over, and kept saying 'What can I give you?, What can I give you?' I gave her directions to the police station, and she started down the hall.

Halfway to the door she turned around."

"I can give you nothing, so I will give you my prayers. Something wonderful will happen to you because you were kind to me."

"And," my mom said, as she finished another rose, "Nine and a half months later, you were born."


"You know," she continued, "I have said my prayers twice a day all my life. I prayed for my family, and I prayed for your dad, and Joe and Tom and Mary, but—after you were born, I suddenly realized what the phrase 'a Child of God' really meant."

I have always thought of you as one of God's own children. One that he had given your dad and I to raise. And when I pray, I always thank God for His trust in us."

"And now you have your own child. She looks like you and Theo, but I hope you always remember that she was given to you by God, and you have the responsibility to raise her as one of God's own children, as well as your own."

2018

I'm in Austin, Texas, holding my first grandchild in my arms. She is perfect in every way, and I am madly in love with her. Her name is Alexandra Marie Wolf, and as my sister Mary put it, "She has no idea how many people already love her."

I tell myself, "Of course she is perfect. She was literally *prayed* into existence."

In addition to the prayers of her parents, candles were lit in every church and monastery in Greece the summer before by her future grandparents. And at every shrine they visited, prayers were said fervently by everyone in their group.

Even the ladies at St. George began praying in earnest when they saw my wife's tears as she watched them lead their own grandchildren up to communion each Sunday.

Then the Lord decided to act. Early last spring, Steve and Danielle called to tell us that a baby was on the way. Witness the power of prayer!

Three months later, a biopsy revealed that the "spot" in my lung was a neuroendocrine tumor. Cancer. Other than a nagging cough, I had shown no other symptoms.

As anyone with cancer will tell you, there are a lot of lonely, sleepless nights filled with prayers, and "Why me's?" and other unspeakable thoughts.

One night I decided to take a break from all of that, and I told myself that I was going to spend some time with my future grandchild. My imagination ran wild as we went to the park and watched the fish swim in the lake. We watched the bugs skim across the surface of the water, and we lay down in the grass and found shapes in the clouds overhead. And then I slept.

In late August, they performed surgery, and removed the lower lobe of my right lung. Recovery was slow and painful, but the thought of holding my grandchild in my arms kept me going.

As Danielle's due date drew near, most people thought the

baby was going to be a boy, but I knew better. It was definitely a girl. When the ultrasound revealed that it was indeed a girl, people asked me how I had been so sure. The answer? In all of my nighttime visits and play-dates with my future grandchild, it had always been a girl. God in His mercy had given me a wonderful gift. He had given me this knowledge to sustain me and give me strength through my surgery and recovery.

And now I am holding her in my arms. She looks like her mother, with a little bit of her father around the mouth and chin, but I know better. This is one of God's own children.

In giving her to Steve and Danielle, God assured her of inheriting Danielle's fearlessness and Steve's great patience. She also inherited her yiyia's common sense and ingenuity, and her grandpa's love of music and all that is beautiful. And her lineage continues back to soldiers and patriots and artists and carpenters and teachers. These are the gifts given to her by God, and these are the gifts that, if developed fully in her lifetime, will enable her to offer their fruits back to her Father "Which art in Heaven," and gain eternal life.



And what is expected of us, then? Simply put, we are charged by God to model love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. These, of course, are the fruits of the Holy Spirit, and make no mistake. When we stand before the dread judgment seat

of Christ on the last day, we will be held accountable for our success or failure regarding the modeling of these virtues. It is an enormous responsibility. With huge consequences.

Fortunately, God in His wisdom has made the first two of these virtues quite simple. As I hold Alexandra in my arms, I find it natural to whisper that "Grandpa loves you" and "You are so beautiful, Alexandra," and all sorts of goofy babblings. And I've caught her Yiyia doing the same thing.

You see, when we look in her eyes we behold all that is holy, and good, and true. Everything else disappears, and it is such a joy and honor to experience the love of God in her eyes.



OUR FEBRUARY FASTING

The traditional fasting from meats, poultry, fish, eggs, and dairy products is observed on Wednesdays and Fridays. During the week following Publican & Pharisee Sunday, February 18-24, there is no fasting on any day (fast free). During the week following Prodigal Son, February 25-March 2, the traditional fasting discipline is observed. In the week following Meatfare Sunday, March 4-10, no meat is eaten; eggs, fish, and dairy are permitted on any day. **Pure Monday is March 11th and begins the Great Fast.**



During the Great Fast we abstain from meat, poultry, eggs, dairy, fish, wine, and olive oil Monday through Friday, with katalysis for wine and olive oil on Saturday and Sunday. During Pure Week it is traditional to keep a total fast until after the Liturgy of the Presanctified Gifts on Wednesday.
